With reference to your request for information I can confirm in accordance with Section 1 (1) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 that we partially hold the information that you have requested. A response to each part of your request is below.

In the request you asked:

1. Do you have a locally commissioned NHS autism assessment service for adults? And if so:

Yes.

a. What is the name and address of the service?

Neurodevelopmental Specialist Service (NeSS) The Pines Highbury Hospital Bullwell Nottingham NG6 9DR

b. What are the current waiting times for new patients being referred to this service?

The current average waiting time for the initial screening of the referral is 12 weeks. This is a screening to check that all the indicators for autism are present. The current wait for a diagnosis is 24 months from the point of referral.

2. Does your CCG have any other contracts, for example with other agencies, companies, or localities, to provide autism assessment services for adults? And if so:

3. Do you have a locally commissioned NHS autism assessment service for children (under 18)? And if so:

There is no one single service commissioned to lead diagnostic assessments for autism. There are a number of providers who contribute to this process. The services commissioned by the CCG are as follows;

Small Steps - is a county service providing early support and evidence-based interventions to families of
children and young people displaying behaviours that cause concern or challenge. Support will be available
where there is no formal diagnosis of ASD or ADHD, but where behaviours maybe indicative or characteristic of
these conditions and also for families of children and young people diagnosed with ASD and/or ADHD.

- The Nottingham City Behavioural and Emotional Health (BEH) Service provides a city service providing early support and evidence-based interventions to families of children and young people displaying behaviours that cause concern or challenge. Support will be available where there is no formal diagnosis of ASD or ADHD, but where behaviours maybe indicative or characteristic of these conditions and also for families of children and young people diagnosed with ASD and/or ADHD.
- Paediatricians at Nottingham University Hospital and Sherwood Forest Hospital work with a range of children
  including where there are medical or physical health concerns, developmental concerns, concerns about
  growth, disability etc. Within the neurodevelopmental pathway community paediatricians will be involved where
  there is concern that there may be an underlying medical or developmental condition to explain a child's
  difficulties and will where appropriate, diagnosis and management of autism spectrum disorders (ASD)
- CAMHS provided by Nottinghamshire Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust will conduct, where appropriate, diagnosis and management of autism spectrum disorders (ASD) where there is a co-occurring mental health presentation.
