



What is it?

The class felt very passionate about this project as recently a staff member and student sadly passed away. Both had received care from the hospice.


The WHOLE school took part, we had a drink station and face painting...

The students organised and planned the whole event and fundraised...











The students raised the outstanding amount of £4500 for the Hospice! A Celebration event will take place this month to thank the They also plan to make this an all thing which is AMAZING!












